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SYLLABUS

TEXTS

Selected etudes by Getchell, Miersch, Pottag, Fearn, Kopprasch, Maxime-Alphonse, Gallay, Kling, Singer, Schantl, Mueller, LaBar and Lacour. Solo repertoire from standard literature for horn. Also selected excerpts from the chamber music, orchestral, and wind ensemble repertoire. Supplemental exercises from instructor. Supplemental readings from texts by Farkas, Tuckwell, Gregory, Morley-Pegge and the IHS Journal, The Horn Call.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1) To develop an understanding of the performance skills necessary in solo and ensemble settings.
- 2) To develop musical understanding and overall musicianship to the limits of the student's ability through artistic mastery of the instrument
- 3) To learn a basic knowledge of all wind instrument performance, such as: tone development, breath support, embouchure, articulations, and intonation
- 4) to gain proficiency in rhythm, sight-reading, style, and transposition
- 5) to learn the basic literature of the instrument
- 6) to develop performance skills
- 7) to develop critical listening skills
- 8) gain an understanding of the pedagogy of the instrument.

COURSE CONTENT

Topical Outline: Musicianship; Phrasing; Tone; Breath Support; Embouchure Development; Legato; Articulation; Finger Technique; Sight-Reading; Scales; Dynamics; Rhythm; Solo and Ensemble Performance; and Aural Skills.

INSTRUCTOR'S EXPECTATIONS

All horn students that are music majors with horn as their major instrument (are registered for 2-4 hours of Private Horn) are required to attend each class. Activities include solo performance; solo performance in a master class setting; ensemble rehearsals and coachings; sectionals for large ensembles; repertoire seminars; etc.

CRITERIA FOR FINAL GRADE

This is a laboratory course and the grade given is "pass" or "fail." The final grade will be based on attendance, performance participation (each student must perform a minimum of four times), participation in discussion, professionalism, preparation, and attitude.

ATTENDANCE

Each student is required to attend all meetings of the class. If there is a conflict, students are to notify the instructor in advance. An absence will be considered UNEXCUSED when the student is not present in class and does not notify the instructor PRIOR TO the scheduled class time. After three unexcused absences, the student will automatically receive a grade of "fail."
